ADMISSIONS

Requirements

Graduation from secondary school required; GED accepted. General college-preparatory program recommended. 4 units of English, 3 units of mathematics, 3 units of science, and 3 units of social studies required. Audition required of music program applicants. Conditional admission and provisional admission for applicants not normally admissible. SAT Reasoning required; ACT may be substituted. No policy for SAT or ACT writing component. Campus visit and admissions interview recommended. Off-campus interview may be arranged with an admissions representative. Admission may be deferred up to one semester. Application fee \$35, nonrefundable.

Basis for Candidate Selection

Academic: Secondary school record and standardized test scores very important. Class rank important.

Admissions Procedure

Normal sequence: No set date by which applicants must accept offer. \$135 room deposit, nonrefundable. Freshmen may enter in terms other than fall. Admissions process is need-blind.

Transfers: Transfer students are accepted. Application deadline is beginning of registration. Minimum 30 semester hours required to apply as a transfer. College transcript and statement of good standing from prior institutions required. Minimum 2.0 college GPA required. Lowest course grade accepted is "C-." At least one-quarter of required semester hours and at least half of major courses must be completed at the school to earn a bachelor's degree.

International Students: Seven degree-seeking undergraduate students enrolled. Separate application required.

Learning Disabled Students: Diagnostic test recommended. Placement tests required. Support services available. Untimed standardized tests accepted.

Placement Options: Credit may be granted for CLEP general exams, CLEP subject exams, and military experience.

Housing

Alcohol prohibited on campus. Class attendance policies set by individual instructors. Dress/hair code. Honor code. Hazing, smoking, and tobacco prohibited. Attendance is mandatory for chapel 12 times. All students may have cars on campus; 85% of students have cars.

Environment/Transportation

300-acre campus in Mt. Vernon (population: 2,301), 85 miles from Macon; branch campus Newnan. Major airport serves Atlanta (180 miles); smaller airport and train serve Savannah (120 miles).
